- 2. The Commission shall consist of six members as follows:

One (1) representative of the Central Coast Regional District Six (6) interested members-at-large


All members are appointed by the Board for a term of one year. Each member is eligible for reappointment at the expiry of his or her term.

Four (4) members shall constitute a quorum.

- 3. Meetings will be called as deemed necessary by four (4) members of the Commission or by the Commission Chair. In any case, the Commission shall meet no less than three (3) times per year.
- 4. A Chairperson shall be elected by the Commission at the first regular meeting in each year.
- 5. The Commission may arrange for secretarial services at the first regular meeting and may set the duties of the secretary such as; recording of the minutes, preparation and filing of all correspondence as directed by the Commission. Minutes shall be recorded for each meeting and forwarded to the Central Coast Regional District.
- 6. Areas of responsibility of the Commission shall be, but are not necessarily limited to the following:

Review and make recommendations regarding leases, budgeting, grant applications, airport improvements, airport revenues, marketing, preparation of a long-term airport development plan; and will include other matters as requested by the Central Coast Regional District from time to time, all of which shall be submitted to the Regional District Board for consideration and possible adoption.

7. The powers delegated to the Commission shall not extend to or include any of the powers of the Regional District Board which are exercised by bylaw only.



- 8. The Commission shall, before the 30th day of October in each year, cause to be prepared and submitted to the Regional Board, a detailed budget outlining its anticipated receipts and expenditures during the next calendar year.
- 9. Bylaws No. 228 and 298 are hereby repealed.
- 10. This bylaw may be cited as the "Central Coast Regional District Denny Island Airport Operations and Management Commission Bylaw No. 470, 2017".

AND WHEREAS a community airport and facility has been established within electoral area A and an Airport Operation and Facilities Extended Service Area has been established by the "Central Coast Regional District Airport Operation and Facilities for Electoral Area 'A' Bylaw No. 188, 1992";

AND WHEREAS pursuant to Section 803 379(1)(e) & 363(1) 397 of the Local Government Act the board may impose fees and charges in respect of the operation and management of the Denny Island Airport;

AND WHEREAS the board of directors for the Central Coast Regional District deem it necessary to establish the rates and charges for the Denny Island Airport Facilities;

NOW THEREFORE THE Board of Directors for the Central Coast Regional District, in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

1. DEFINITIONS

> Refers to the Denny Island Airport, located on Denny Island at the head of Airport: Kliktsoatli Harbour, and includes a runway, parking area and other things associated with airport facilities.

2. All users of the airport and facilities shall be subject to the rates and charges prescribed in Schedule 'A' attached hereto and forming part of this bylaw.

3. **RATES AND CHARGES**

The rates and charges set out in Schedule 'A' hereto attached shall be due and payable thirty (30) days after the billing date, and any rates or charges remaining unpaid after the said date shall have added thereto a percentage addition of 2% per month on the outstanding balance.

Rates and charges will be reviewed annually by the Denny Island Airport Commission and may be subject to an adjustment based on a recommendation from the commission to the Central Coast Regional District board of directors.

- 4. The Denny Island Airport Commission may recommend an adjustment to any rate or charge fixed in Schedule 'A'.
- 5.



Re: George Massey Tunnel Replacement Project - Highway Infrastructure Features

In December 2015, the Project Definition Report for the George Massey Tunnel Replacement Project (the Project) was released that contained conceptual drawings of the Project, including detail of the proposed Steveston Highway and Highway 17A interchange ramps in plan view with limited information on the proposed vertical profiles.

Beginning in late June 2016, scaled model displays of the proposed new bridge and the two interchanges at Steveston Highway and Highway 17A have been available for public viewing at the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure's (the Ministry) Project office in Richmond.

As the latest project models revealed new information in terms of the vertical profiles of the structures and their relation to adjacent existing structures and buildings, Richmond City Council, at its Regular Council meeting held on Tuesday, October 11, 2016, considered a staff report regarding the highway infrastructure features of the Project and adopted the following resolution:

(1) Richmond City Council reconfirms its significant concerns regarding the proposed bridge project to replace the George Massey Tunnel and encourages the Province of British Columbia to work with the Cities of Richmond and Delta, Metro Vancouver, Translink and other interested parties to implement solutions to the urgent problem of congestion on Highway 99 that are more compatible with the regional transportation network, the enhancement of public transportation in the region, protection of the environment, protection of farmland, consistency with the Regional Growth Strategy, protection of our quality of life and other important factors:







- If the Province decides to proceed with the current proposal to replace the Massey Tunnel, that the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure be strongly urged to significantly reduce the size and project scope of the Steveston Highway interchange and Highway 99, including:
- (a) measures be incorporated into the design of the Steveston Highway Interchange ramps to mitigate the noise, lighting and visual impacts of the ramps such as the installation of a green wall/vertical garden or other decorative concrete forms on the vertical walls;
- (b) principles to ensure the security of transit passengers (i.e., Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) and mitigation measures to address the noise, visual and air quality impacts be incorporated into the design of the transit exchange located within the Steveston Highway Interchange; and
- (c) the design for the widening of Highway 99 near the Steveston Highway Interchange be re-examined with a view to minimizing the extent of widening while not comprising safety and its functions;
- (3) That a follow-up letter be sent to the Provincial Agricultural Land Commission reiterating the City's concerns regarding the Ministry's application for Transportation, Utility and Recreational Trail Use along the Highway 99 corridor to allow for the widening of Highway 99 as part of the Project;
- (4) That the report titled "George Massey Tunnel Replacement Project Highway Infrastructure Features" dated September 28, 2016 be forwarded to the British Columbia Environmental Assessment Office for consideration as part of the City's second round of comments further to the initial 30-day Working Group review period on the Provincial Environmental Assessment Application for the George Massey Tunnel Replacement Project; and
- (5) That a letter containing this resolution and the report entitled George Massey Tunnel Replacement Project – Highway Infrastructure Features, dated September 28, 2016 and related information be sent to the Premier, the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure, Richmond MPs and MLAs, the Mayor of Delta, Metro Vancouver, Translink, and to BC Mayors and Councils (through CivicInfo).

Further details of Richmond City Council's on-going and unresolved concerns with the Project since its announcement in September 2013 are provided in the attached past Council resolutions and staff reports.

We trust that the above Council resolutions will be considered seriously by the Ministry before this project is advanced any further and that your collaboration with all regional stakeholders is committed now to seek a collectively supported solution to the current transportation crisis.

Subject: Short Term Rentals in the Tourism Accommodation Sector

Our Council appreciates that the Province is giving serious consideration to the 'sharing economy' in BC. We applaud the focus that your Ministry is bringing to these issues and to the impacts to communities arising from this new economy.

In Harrison Hot Springs, short term rentals within the tourism accommodation sector are of particular concern. This growing commercial activity within residential areas is problematic in terms of traffic, noise and security. While we work to amend our zoning regulations to recognise this activity, we ask that the Province also recognise the commercial nature of this new tourism accommodation sector through the sales tax system. These rental units represent direct competition with established hotels, motels and inns, which are properly regulated in terms of health & safety, zoning and taxation. We are particularly concerned that these units are not recognised as public accommodation for the purposes of fire protection requirements.

What we are seeing here in Harrison is a growing and lucrative commercial economy which is operating outside the established Provincial Sales Tax system, including the Municipal Regional District Tax (MRDT) which funds tourism marketing locally and on a provincial level. The best way to address this is to rescind Section 78(1)(b) of BC's PST Refund and Exemption Regulation, which exempts accommodation providers with fewer than 4 units of accommodation.

Short term rentals are not the bed & breakfasts of yesteryear, instead they are part of a growing economy which is operating outside of appropriate regulation and taxation. We look forward to your response to this issue of growing concern.
